2025 ccNSO Achievements

Feb - 2026

Dear Colleagues

In 2025, we had to navigate under major political leadership transitions, ongoing conflicts, while public protests and global forums pressed leaders to address governance, security, and inequality. The year was also one of the warmest on record, with devastating heatwaves, powerful storms, and widespread wildfires. In the middle of these challenges, more women assumed top political roles. In addition, science, medicine, and nature made remarkable advances, from private lunar missions and new astronomical discoveries to rare deep-sea life observations and breakthroughs in gene-editing therapies, transplant science, and disease prevention.

From the ccNSO perspective, 2025 was a year of self-reflection and setting the direction for continuous improvement:

During the first half of the year, the ccTLD Financial Contributions review reaffirmed the strong and mutually valued relationship between ICANN and the ccTLD community. Both ICANN and the ccNSO acknowledged the community's significant role in supporting ICANN's work, while also emphasizing the voluntary nature of ccTLD financial contributions, which help cover ICANN's operational costs.

Building on the community consultation that shaped our 2030 vision, we continue to respond to the clear call to strengthen relationships across the ICANN community. Recognizing this as both an opportunity and a responsibility, we have deepened our collaboration with the Governmental Advisory Committee (GAC) and the Registry Stakeholder Group (RySG).

As part of this year's key milestones, the ICANN Board adopted the ccNSO recommendations on a review mechanism for a limited set of decisions pertaining to the delegation, transfer, revocation, and retirement of ccTLDs, the second part of the third ccNSO Policy Development Process. Following the completion of the IANA Policy Gap Analysis, the proposed Study Groups on Disaster Recovery and IANA Public Records Accuracy were launched.

At the end of the year, after 3 years of hard work with over 7,000 items audited, more than 40 calls, and countless hours from community volunteers, the ccNSO Secretariat, and ICANN's ITI team reviewing design, functionality, and updating content, the new ccNSO website¹ is finally live. This achievement is the result of incredible teamwork, dedication, and persistence, and marks an exciting landmark for the ccNSO.

I am deeply grateful for the extraordinary dedication and unwavering commitment of our volunteers, whose contributions make such a meaningful difference. To all community members who participate both in person and remotely, your insights, engagement, and collaboration are truly inspiring. I feel profoundly honored to be part of this vibrant and passionate community, and I am continually humbled by the generosity, expertise, and shared spirit that everyone brings to our work.

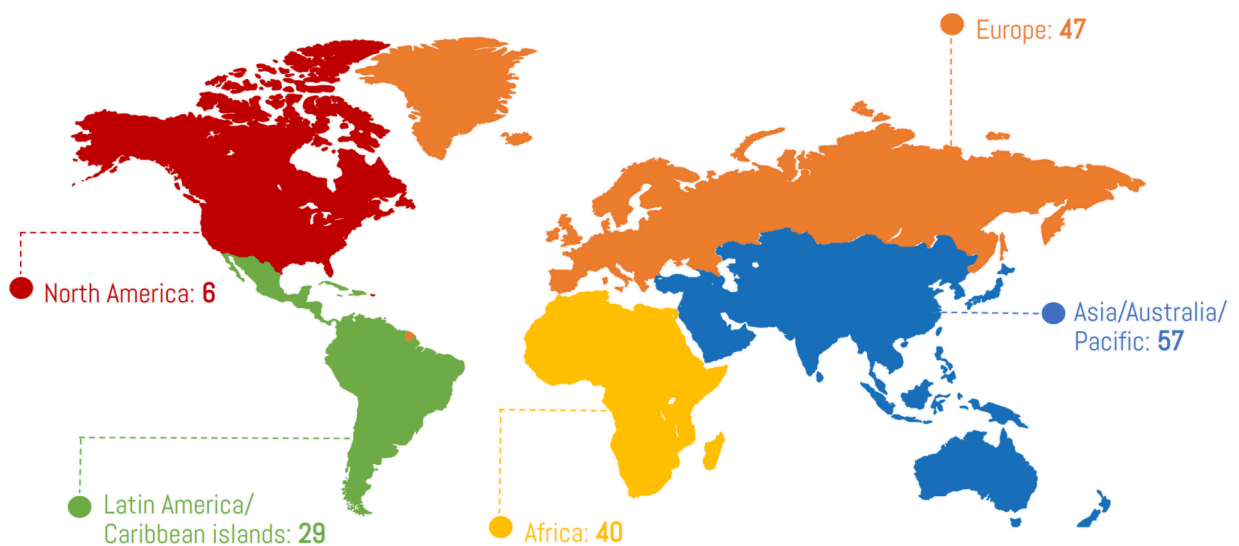

Working Groups

- [Onboarding and Mentoring Committee \(OMC\)](#)

2025 has been a productive and constructive year for the OMC, as the Committee continued its efforts to strengthen and refine onboarding and mentoring support for new ccNSO participants. Throughout the year, the OMC focused on translating identified priorities into practical actions aimed at improving the overall onboarding experience and encouraging sustained engagement.

Significant progress was made in developing clearer, more structured onboarding materials to help newcomers better understand the ccNSO and the broader ICANN ecosystem. The OMC also worked to reinforce the mentoring and buddy programs, placing greater emphasis on clearer role definitions, improved mentor–newcomer matching, and more consistent follow-up during the early stages of participation.

In addition, the Committee supported informal engagement opportunities, including casual meet-ups for newcomers, which proved to be highly effective in fostering connections and encouraging participation. The casual meet-up held in Prague was particularly successful, providing a welcoming and relaxed setting where newcomers could interact directly with experienced ccNSO members, ask questions, and build relationships. These interactions helped strengthen a sense of community and increased newcomer confidence and engagement in ccNSO activities.

Through these efforts, the OMC contributed to creating a more inclusive, supportive, and welcoming environment, enabling new members to integrate more effectively and to engage with confidence in ccNSO activities and ICANN processes.

- [Triage Committee](#)

The Council Triage Committee was established in 2013 to review incoming [requests](#)² for input and make recommendations to the Council on how to respond to these requests. Over time the role of the Committee evolved in advising Council on managing and prioritization of the ccNSO workload.

Starting at the end of 2024 and in 2025 the Triage Committee organized two workshops for Councillors and Committee leadership on how to increase the capacity of the ccNSO to deliver on its work items. The main result of these workshops was recognition that working smarter (improve working methods, better monitoring and planning) would have a greatest impact.

To prioritize work items and manage the workload the Triage Committee develops and proposes to Council annually the ccNSO two-year forward looking portfolio of activities that add value to the [purpose and goals of the ccNSO](#)³. The latest iteration of the [portfolio](#)⁴ was adopted by Council in July 2025, and for the first time includes weighing the anticipated workload against capacity, resulting in advice to Council to defer the start of some work items. Related, the Triage Committee reviews progress against planning and reports quarterly to Council. The latest 2025 monitor can be found [here](#).

- [ccNSO Disaster Recovery Study Group](#)

With the conclusion of the Policy Gap Analysis Working Group (PAG WG), the work on potential gaps in ccTLD policy continues. The Study Group on the role of IANA in ccTLD Disaster Recovery, or Study Group Disaster Recovery (SGDR) in short, is the first of a series of Study Groups to further investigate issues identified by the PGA WG.

Study groups are short term groups that investigate an issue to make recommendations to the ccNSO Council. They do not propose or define policy. We are supposed to deliver by mid 2026.

In 2025, we held an information collection session during ICANN84 and discussed "disaster recovery" from the perspective of the ccTLDs and IANA. We started documenting current ccTLD practices and industry definitions of the term that could help frame the scope.

The group continues to work on detailed suggestions for a potential role for IANA in ccTLD disaster recovery.



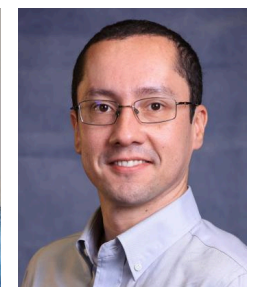

- [Meetings Programme Committee \(MPC\)](#)

Looking back at 2025, the MPC acted as a vital stage where the global mosaic of ccTLDs transformed shared challenges into actionable insights. Throughout the ccNSO Members Meetings in Seattle, Prague, and Dublin, the collective commitment to sharing best practices stood out as the true engine of our community's strength.

In 2025, we prioritized impactful results through our 12 working sessions, held to inform and enrich our community's work. The ccTLD News at each Members Meeting sessions showcased a remarkable breadth of resourcefulness, focusing on proactive DNS abuse mitigation, Universal Acceptance, and innovative marketing strategies. The MPC also facilitated crucial dialogues on DNS next-generation research, new legislative frameworks, and the digital divide. These sessions were the culmination of the MPC's mission to coordinate and manage the high-level schedule and strategic agendas for the ccNSO Members Meetings.

Our focus for 2026 is to deepen this value as we prepare for Mumbai, Seville, and Muscat. We are currently supported by 20 members and 7 observers, to whom our heartfelt thanks go. We are always open for new members who would like to contribute by helping us find great stories to be shared at the ccNSO Members Meetings. If you want to be part of that effort, join us!

- [DNS Abuse Standing Committee \(DASC\)](#)

The ccNSO DNS Abuse Standing Committee (DASC) was established in 2022 in response to growing community interest around DNS Abuse. DASC serves as a forum for ccTLD managers to exchange information, share insights, and discuss practical approaches to preventing and mitigating DNS Abuse with peers and the wider ICANN community. The DASC comprises more than 40 ccTLD representatives and benefits from active engagement across the ICANN ecosystem through open working group sessions. While there is no room for complacency, ccTLDs do continue to experience significantly lower levels of abuse compared to gTLDs. Consequently, there is strong and growing community interest in the work of the committee.

Recognising that ccTLDs operate under national legal frameworks and retain responsibility for their own policies, the DASC does not develop policy. Instead, its focus is on awareness-raising, sharing best practices, capacity building, and facilitating constructive community dialogue on DNS Abuse prevention and mitigation.

In 2025, the DASC was highly active, organising sessions at all ICANN public meetings, holding monthly virtual meetings of the full committee, convening ad hoc sub-groups for specific projects, delivering informational webinars, and contributing to third-party events by invitation.

At **ICANN82 in Seattle**, the DASC hosted a session on domain name registration data accuracy and its relationship to DNS Abuse. The discussion explored how accessibility, accuracy, and privacy of registration data intersect with abuse mitigation efforts. Case studies from .se and .nz were complemented by perspectives from law enforcement and the registrar community. Topics included verification practices, the use of RDAP and secure API-based access for investigators, proportionality in handling abuse reports, data protection obligations, and the challenges posed by a lack of harmonised cross-border data sharing mechanisms.

At **ICANN83 in Prague**, following community feedback, the DASC focused on online scams and financial crime. The session examined how ccTLDs detect and mitigate scam-related DNS Abuse, with context from the FBI's Internet Crime Report and perspectives from the Internet Infrastructure Coalition (represented by Verisign). ccTLDs .sg and .au presented their roles within national anti-fraud strategies, highlighting automated detection tools, operational workflows, and collaboration with law enforcement and cybersecurity agencies. Key themes included the need for improved transparency, standardised reporting, and stronger inter-registry cooperation.

At **ICANN84 in Dublin**, the DASC contributed to ccNSO Tech Day with a session on artificial intelligence (AI) and DNS Abuse. Presentations from .uk, .us, and .eu explored how AI can enhance abuse detection while also being exploited by malicious actors. Discussions covered AI-driven identification of phishing and botnets, emerging behavioural analysis techniques, and the growing risks posed by AI-generated content, synthetic identities, and automated abuse campaigns. AI and its implications for DNS Abuse mitigation are expected to remain a key area of focus for the ccNSO community going forward.

- [Internet Governance Liaison Committee \(IGLC\)](#)

The IGLC has active members from around 30 ccTLDs across all ICANN regions, who meet fortnightly via webinar to share insights, to discuss the impact of policy/regulatory issues on ccTLDs, and consider long term Internet governance trends.

Our focus for 2025 was the UN's 20-year review of the World Summit on the Information Society (WSIS+20) and how ccTLDs can influence the review. This provided an important opportunity for ccTLD managers, as representatives of the global technical community, to engage in discussion and advocacy in support of a multistakeholder approach to Internet governance, underlining the shared goal of keeping the Internet open, free, global, secure, resilient, and interoperable for all. Many IGLC members were directly engaged in these processes and contributed regular updates and analysis through IGLC meetings.

In addition to online meetings, the IGLC held working sessions during ICANN meetings and engaged with members of ICANN's Government Engagement team, members of the IGF Multistakeholder Advisory Group and representatives from the IGF Leadership Panel.

2025 highlights included two sessions organised by the IGLC as part of the CCNSO members meeting:

- '20 years of WSIS implementation and the road ahead' explored the history of WSIS and its relevance today to ccTLDs today. Two ccTLD managers shared how their activities contribute to achieving the WSIS goals (ICANN82)
- 'WSIS+20 and Beyond' provided an opportunity for direct engagement with WSIS co-facilitator, His Excellency Ekitele Lokaale. Vint Cerf shared views on the IGF and leaders from the ccTLD community spoke about the importance of the technical community in multistakeholder Internet governance.

The WSIS+20 concluded on 17 December with consensus to reaffirm the multistakeholder approach, recognise the importance of the Internet's technical community and create a permanent mandate for the IGF.

The IGLC looks forward to continuing to strengthen sharing relevant regional regulatory and policy developments and promote ongoing ccTLD engagement in global Internet governance processes. We are currently updating our future work program, and we invite all ccTLD managers to participate in the IGLC's work and new members are always welcome.

- [Strategic and Operational Planning Committee \(SOPC\)](#)

The Strategic and Operational Planning Committee (SOPC) faced a new challenge in 2025. After reviewing Draft ICANNs Operating Plan and Budget for fiscal year 2026 and submitting comments on it in February, the SOPC noticed that the version of FY26 budget for ICANN Board approval published in May 2025 demonstrated a noticeable increase in Funding projection and corresponding increase in expenses.

SOPC was concerned with the fact that while the Draft Budget proposal was presented to the community in accordance with a clear framework (webinars, time for clarification question, followed by a 60-day public comment period, etc.), the revised version for Board approval did not follow any such framework. The SOPC raised the issues with ccNSO Council and contacted ICANN's planning team and the new ICANN CEO, Kurtis Lindqvist, directly to point out that this approach is not consistent with ICANN's transparency and accountability mechanisms and that we saw a significant lack of information being provided to the ACs and SOs. We are pleased to report that our efforts led to a new Framework for Revisions to the Operating Plan and Budget⁵, which will ensure transparency and accountability throughout the planning. It is also good evidence that the SOPC is adequately fulfilling its role as representative of the ccTLD community in strategic and budgetary matters.

Furthermore, with the Management Framework Program⁶, we see an important element gaining momentum. As SOPC, we would now like to see this filled with substance and become an established framework at ICANN. SOPC will monitor further progress in 2026 as one of its focus areas.

SOPC was also involved in the second ccNSO Finance Working Group (FIN2 WG). The objective of the second Finance Working Group was to review, explore and propose financial contribution models that are fair and equitable, and encourage ccTLDs to contribute at a level deemed reasonable, while preserving the principle of voluntary contributions. We are pleased to have contributed to the success of this important project, which was approved at the ICANN meeting in Dublin and provides clarity to ccNSO members regarding their voluntary contributions.

- [Guidelines Review Committee \(GRC\)](#)

In 2025, the GRC worked on core guidelines and practical contributions to the Continuous Improvement Framework (CIP), using different tools to improve not only how the committee conducts its work, but also how it presents its work to the community. Feedback on CIP initiatives remains very positive.

A central accomplishment in 2025 was the completion of substantial revisions to the ccNSO Council Election Guideline. Building on observations from the 2025 election process report, the GRC refined nomination and seconding rules, clarified eligibility expectations, and introduced clearer definitions and a shared glossary. We believe the changes will improve the election process, as they better reflect how the community participates in practice.

In parallel, the GRC advanced detailed work on the Director Removal and Board Recall Guideline. Across multiple readings, the committee resolved long-standing ambiguities. The introduction of visual process diagrams and the separation of guidelines from templates improve understanding and usability. It is our hope that membership will find these changes useful to understand some of the more opaque guidelines. We look forward to community feedback on these changes as this type of improvement becomes more widespread in the guidelines. We believe this change will make our guidelines more accessible.

The GRC also played an active role in supporting the ccNSO response to ICANN's Continuous Improvement Framework. This included a World Cafe session on implementing the Continuous Improvement Framework in Dublin. The GRC continues to work on identifying implementation areas. This included preparation for workshops and discussions designed to ensure continuous improvement supports the community rather than becoming a procedural exercise. I would personally like to thank Irina Danelia for her work on this file.

The GRC continues its ongoing effort to improve how guidelines interact with Council timelines and community processes. To this end, while the GRC's membership is small, it is very committed, and we continue to do our best to assist the council on pressing concerns.

I would like to thank the members of the GRC, my vice chair, Segun, and our staff for their steady commitment and thoughtful contributions throughout the year, and the wider ICANN staff, who have again stepped up for our CIP events. These events are well-received in the anecdotal feedback we get, and it just would not be possible otherwise. I would also like to thank the Google Docs fairy, who makes the wonderful diagrams increasingly part of more guidelines.

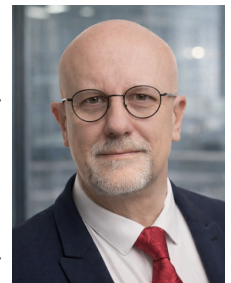
- [TLD-OPS Standing Committee](#)

In 2025, cybersecurity threats have not diminished; on the contrary, they have intensified. In this environment, the TLD-OPS Working Group has continued to deliver on its mandate by providing operational support to ccTLD registries facing a rising volume of incidents, including DDoS attacks, malware, and phishing. This work is enabled by a trusted secure mailing list and a set of dedicated activities that facilitate the secure preparation and exchange of sensitive information.

At ICANN 84 in Dublin, the TLD-OPS Working Group convened a workshop to brief participants on the current threat landscape and to present practical measures to strengthen registry defenses. Through real-world use cases and accessible, easy-to-deploy open-source tools, participants examined concrete approaches to improving day-to-day security operations.

In 2026, the Steering Committee will build on the progress achieved in recent years by continuing to support registries, encouraging non-participating ccTLDs to join the secure mailing list, and initiating a review of the group's charter to reassess its founding objectives and update them as appropriate.

This engagement will also continue through the ccNSO study group launched in late 2025, which focuses on registry disaster recovery planning and potential IANA actions to further support ccTLDs.
